

Know Before You Go

Before hitting the trails, be prepared! Check the weather, bring plenty of water, snacks, and layers for changing conditions. Sturdy footwear is a must, and hiking poles can help on steep or uneven terrain. Always let someone know your plans and be bear aware—carry bear spray and know how to use it. Cell service is limited in many areas, so download maps in advance. Leave no trace—pack out everything you pack in and respect wildlife and trail etiquette.

Forest Service Road (FSR) Travel Reminders

Many trails in the Columbia Valley backcountry are accessed via Forest Service Roads (FSRs). These roads can be rough, remote, and vary in condition. Keep the following in mind before heading out:

- A high-clearance, 4x4 vehicle is strongly recommended.
- Road conditions can change quickly—check in with your local Visitor Centre for the latest updates.
- Many FSRs are located in active logging or mining areas. Drive cautiously, give logging trucks the right of way, and pull over when safe to do so.
- If you're using a rental vehicle, double-check your rental policy – insurance coverage may not apply on FSRs.

Trail Safety & Etiquette

- Pack it in, pack it out—take all garbage with you, including food waste like apple cores.
- Keep pets under control and clean up after them.
- Stay on marked trails to avoid damaging sensitive ecosystems.
- Respect wildlife—never approach, feed, or attempt to interact with animals.
- Be bear aware: travel in groups, make noise, and carry bear spray (and know how to use it).
- Fires are only permitted in designated areas—never start a fire outside of approved sites, and keep an eye on any current campfire bans.
- Weather can change quickly in the mountains—always bring appropriate gear and clothing.

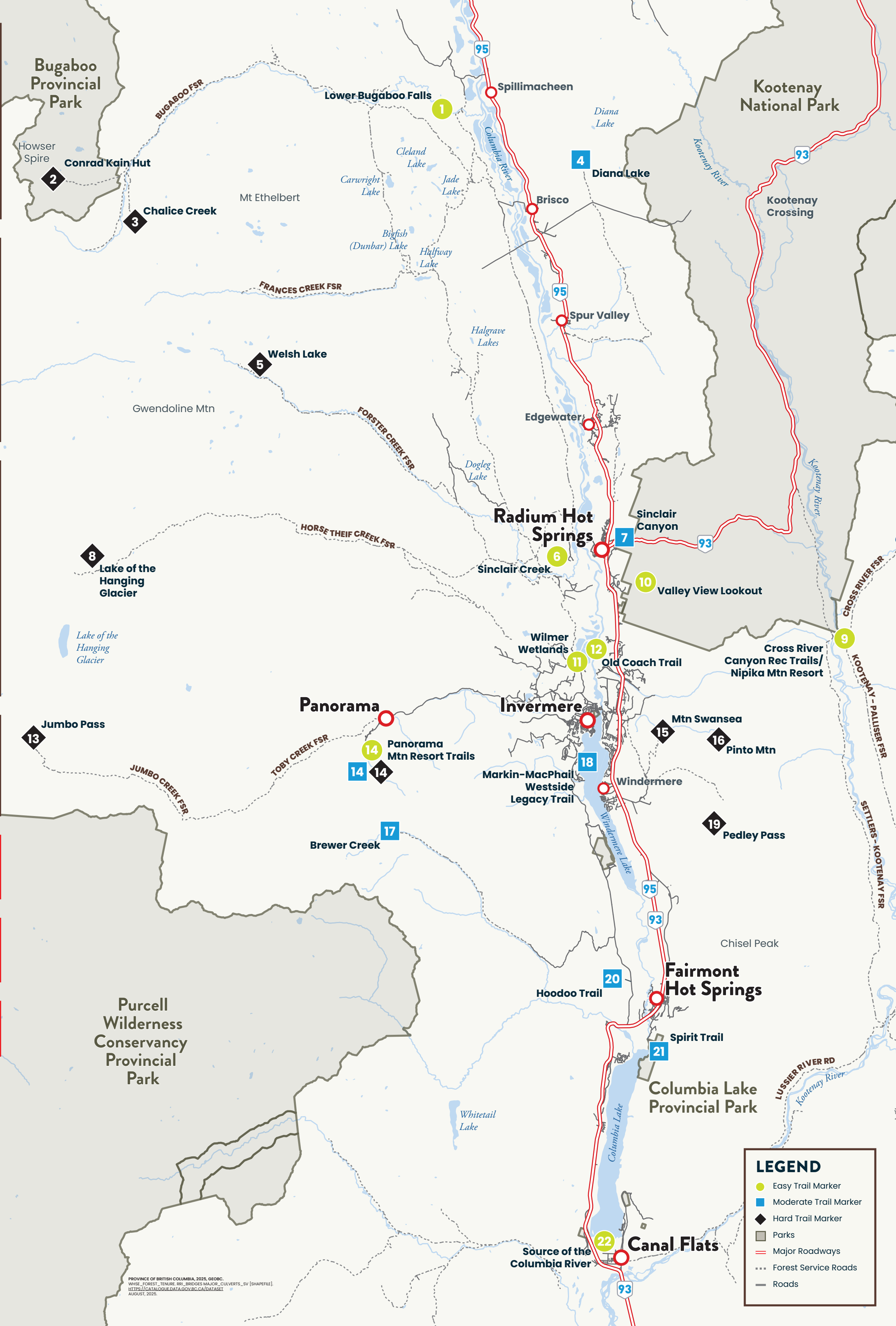
